Community donations also have played a role, with the league raising more than \$6,000 through fundraisers, Miller said.

The lights arrived earlier this month. "All the labor (for installation) is going to be volunteer labor," Coy said.

Volunteers believe they can begin work during the winter months and have the lights ready for the league's April 24th opening day.

While an illuminated field is expect-

ed to greatly benefit Conemaugh Valley Youth League, organizers pledge it will not negatively impact borough residents.

That's because the league will cover operational costs for the energy-efficient lights, Miller said.

He added that the bulbs are designed so that they "concentrate all the light on the field," limiting any "spill" lighting on nearby homes or roads.

Also, officials said all games will end before 10 p.m. in compliance with East Conemaugh's curfew.
